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A costume designer has a lot of things to consider when creating the costumes for a show.

- Show concept
- Period
- Character
- Practicality

Show Concept

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As with every show, there is a concept or overall vision for the show.

- The designers and director will discuss and create a concept.
- Is the show time period accurate? What is the world like?

Period

Period is the time and place in which the show takes place.

- What era are we in?
- Where are we?
- What season is it?
- What did people wear at this time?
- What do people of this class wear?
- What fabrics were used?
- What was their hair like?

You'll discuss a lot of this with the director. If they tell you we're doing high class victorian in the spring, there you go. The designers job is now to figure that out through...

RESEARCH!

Costume design is a HEAVY research field. Any show is going to involve at least a little but more than likely, it'll be a LOT.

Research

The internet is your friend. You'll be pulling from a number of sources such as:

- Past Productions
- Paintings of and from that era
- Period Patterns
- Articles and essays on the period
 - Chances are, someone has done the exact research you're doing

Character

Perhaps most important is to represent the character.

You know the period and style of the show, but how does a character fit into it? Does this person wear bright colors? Are they modest? How rich are they? Do they care about their appearance? What is their job?

Getting a sense of who the character *is* and what their clothes says about them is key.

Practical

Costumes have to function. Things to consider when designing a costume:

- Do they have to dance, run or move in this costume?
- Do actors have to quickly get into or out of this costume?
- Will this costume look really funky under lights?
- Will this costume **read** from the audience?
- Can we afford to make this costume?
- Do we have time to make this costume?
